In the early 1980's Mr. Ray Rivers called a meeting for people interested in wood turning. The first meeting was held at his residence on Toohey Street Cairns with 12-15 men attending.

They continued to meet once a month at various places for approximately two years participating in and observing different types of woodworking activities.

During this time the group conducted several workshops inviting the community to attend. Two of the most successful were a workshop on woodturning green timber with a guest woodturner from the United States at the Cairns show grounds with 40 people attending, and later a workshop at the TAFE where 80 attended.

At this time the club was officially named the "Cairns and Districted Woodworkers Guild". Mr. Rivers retired from his President's position. Ruddy Moffet became the second President and held the monthly meeting at his residence Miles Street, Manoora for two years.

From these humble beginnings these dedicated woodworkers incorporated the club in 1996 and in 2001 the Guild was offered a building on Knight Street from the Cairns Regional Council where they could set up a permanent workshop.

In the early days the members accrued thousands of hours towards fundraising, and were also fortunate to be the recipient of generous grants from Cairns Regional Council, to equip the workshop with machines and tools required to ensure a safe and up-to-date workshop for members and the community. The Guild facilities are a source of pride to the members.

The Guild has now been operational for over 30 years this is quite an achievement in today's world, and demonstrates the value of being part of a club.

The Cairns Woodworkers Guild prides itself on giving to fellow members and the community. Great satisfaction comes from learning and sharing your skills in a supportive and friendly environment, and building enduring friendships while building your skills in a supportive social environment!

"Learn, Share, Create"

Giving back to the community is an important part of the Guild, supporting both ARC Disabilities and Cootharinga North Queensland on a weekly basis by providing the organisations clients a place of opportunity where they can design and build their own woodwork projects. The Guild provides the materials, and more importantly members deliver instruction and assistance to bring the project concept to reality. Each individual is generally very happy and express joy and satisfaction with their achievement.

We are committed to developing a skill base for all, especially our younger members. This is where the future of woodworking lies, and anyone interested in continuing the woodworking traditions have the tools, equipment, expertise and support they require to thrive.

The work continues to upgrading the building and equipment ensuring that the Guild provides a building and equipment are safe, up to date and inviting.

Membership Fees	<p>Adult membership: \$80.00 (<i>Pensions discounts apply</i>)</p> <p>Student membership: \$50.00 (12 - 18 years)</p> <p><i>A one-off induction fee is payable in conjunction with your annual fee: \$60.00</i></p>
Workshop - Sign in and Attendance Fee	<p>When attending the Guild, you must sign in/out on the Guild sign in book.</p> <p>A \$5.00 attendance fee is payable each time you visit the Guild and use equipment. An honour box is located by the sign in book.</p> <p>Consumables used which you didn't bring will also be paid for at time of use/attendance E.g., sandpaper, glues, lacquers, oils, hardware. Membership fees do not cover the use of electricity, consumables tea/coffee/biscuits. during your visits.</p> <p>Exemptions: <i>If are working on a club project you will not be expected to pay the attendance fee and/or need to pay for consumables. Simply note your reason for non-payment in the attendance book. E.g., "on duty", "club work" (note the committee is to be advised via email of club work prior to starting the project).</i></p>
Machinery Safety Induction	<p>Your safety is our number one concern, seconded only by the safe and proper use of the machinery. The machinery safety induction is a compulsory part of the joining the Guild and can be done in stages for machines you wish to use for your project.</p> <p>All NEW members are required to be signed off, "competent", on each machine before being able to use it by oneself.</p> <p>The <i>initial induction session</i> will generally include 3/4 pieces of machinery of your choice and will take about 3 hours, this is usually done on a Saturday and has to be booked in. Other machine inductions can be booked with the workshop foreman once the initial session is completed.</p> <p>Please note assistance is always provided until you feel confident in using the machines unsupervised. However, some machines will require two people to complete a task.</p>
Club Induction	<p>The club induction includes a walk around the Guild and a coffee. We will show you where everything is; sign in and message books, toilets, kitchen, gallery, first aid box and process, fire evacuation map, bins (we have different bins for different rubbish).</p> <p>While having a coffee we run through the any questions you have regarding the general rules, code of conduct, calendar of events etc and importantly what you want to learn and make.</p>
Code of Conduct	<p>The Code sets out the responsibilities and standard of behaviour for members of the Cairns & District Woodworkers Guild. It is not a comprehensive list but a broad framework to make appropriate and ethical decisions about their behaviour.</p> <p>A copy of the Code would have been emailed in your membership package. However, it is available in hard and soft copy on request. Please ensure you read the</p>

code of conduct in conjunction with the Guidelines.

Workshop

Required PPE	<p>Members working in the workshop area are required to wear Personal Protection Equipment (PPE).</p> <p>Minimum requirement: covered shoes, safety glasses and appropriate clothing (not loose-fitting cloths).</p> <p>Other recommendations: ear muffs/ear plugs, dust mask. Also remove jewellery, tie up long hair and follow all safety instructions. If you are working in the clubhouse PPE is not required.</p> <p>It is the responsibility of each member to ensure they have appropriate PPE for each task they are undertaking.</p>
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Workshop Description	<p>The Club Workshop has four separate areas.</p> <p>Machinery Room 1 – table saw, plane/ jointer, belt sander, disc sander, bobbin sander, circular sander, small circular saw.</p> <p>Machinery Room 2 – thicknesser, drill-presses and bandsaws x 3</p> <p>Woodturning room – woodturning lathes</p> <p>Workbench Area (Open area) – work benches, circular saw, and scroll saw.</p> <p>All machines are connected to the dust extraction system located beside the woodturning room.</p> <p>There are also several timber storage areas. There is a great variety of timber available for members to purchase and use. 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Waste Management	<p>There are a couple of waste streams for the Guild to manage.</p> <p>There are coded wheelie bins for waste; Wood scraps, Tin Cans, Recycle and General Rubbish. Members must sort their waste into the appropriate bin.</p> <p>The dust extractor takes sawdust, wood shavings and other floor sweepings into large plastic bags for donation.</p> <p>Unfortunately, there is no Council rubbish collection at the Guild so regular trips to the CRC Rubbish tip is required. Members will be asked on a by monthly basis to assist.</p>

Maintenance
Working Bees**

Having a clean and tidy workshop and clubhouse is extremely important for the safety and comfort of members.

The Guild has cleaning equipment available to all members. If it is not there, not working, or you're not sure... just ask the Key Holder on duty.

Workshop Cleaning:

- ✓ Put away anything you have use; tools to consumables;
- ✓ Clean machinery you have used (dustpan/brushes, vacuums and air guns are available);
- ✓ Tidy the work bench so it is ready to the next member to use;

Things break, it's no biggie, report to key holder and write in the message book also if you notice or think something is missing or 'not quite right' let them know that as well.

We do have a cleaning roster, some are done by individuals on any day, and we do have a working bee day for bigger cleaning tasks. This will be posted on the notice board and you can choose which one you want to do.

Workshop maintenance: The Guild Maintenance facilitator will organise the maintenance days, this is a great opportunity to not only keep tools and machine in good working condition but learn how.

Working Bees: are held for making commission work, making products for the gallery, timber collection, timber processing and slabbing, off site milling of timber etc.

The dates for any of these activities will be information at the monthly meetings.

At the end of the day please help the Key Holder do final clean, tidy and lock up as this goes hand in hand with making your master piece. If everyone has cleaned up their own area, it really should only be a quick vacuuming/blowing of the floor/benches it the outdoor workshop area and a quick check in the clubhouse.

<p>Clubhouse Description</p>	<p>We are very fortunate to have such a great clubhouse. We use it for club meetings, coffee/meal breaks, drawing up your project plans, research from the library books and magazines, and most importantly conversing with your woodworking colleagues.</p> <p>We provide; a cold-water dispenser, tea and coffee making facilities, along with tea, coffee & biscuits. Soft drinks are for sale a \$1.50 each. We also have a refrigerator, oven, microwave kettle and toaster.</p> <p>We all need to pitch in to keep the kitchen and other areas clean and tidy. Which means washing your dishes, emptying the bin, putting things you have use away, keeping benches clear of random wood working items and tools. Be proactive, I you see something that needs doing just do it.</p> <p>It's also a Gallery to raise funds. We have working bees to create product and members can display and sell their work in the gallery with 15% of the sell price going to the Guild.</p> <p>Books and magazines may be borrowed and returned just fill in the Borrowing Book.</p> <p>Clubhouse cleaning: There are only a few basic cleaning tasks to be done on a regular basis. e.g, lawn mowing, toilet / kitchen/clubhouse, clean fridges/freezers etc. An annual top to bottom clean will be arranged for the end of the year.</p> <p>We do have a cleaning roster, some are done by individuals on any day, and we do have a working bee day for bigger cleaning tasks. This will be posted on the notice board and you can choose which one you want to do.</p>
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<p>Meetings - Club and Annual General</p>	<p>Club meetings are held bimonthly (from February) on the 3rd Saturday - 9.00 – 10.30 am. Members will be advised via email/noticeboard. <i>(Dates may change for public holidays)</i>.</p> <p>Morning tea is held after each meeting to chat and exchange ideas with your fellow woodworkers. Woodworking resumes after the meeting.</p> <p>As a member, we encourage you to attend the meetings to put forward your suggestions, concerns, votes, assistance and to be informed on what is happening.</p> <p>If you have any items for the agenda email to – contactus@woodiescairns.org.au or, you can raise them in the General Business section of the meeting agenda.</p> <p><i>We know it can be difficult sometimes, but as a member it is your right, and your responsibility to the Guild to attend as many meetings as possible.</i></p> <p>The Annual General Meeting (AGM) is announced towards the end of the financial year after the financial statement is available (June), the AGM is generally held in August.</p> <p>Nominations for new committee nominations can be emailed to the secretary no less than one week prior to the AGM or put forward on the day. Apologies can be emailed to the secretary prior to the AGM, and proxy forms are available.</p>
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Please Note: If no new committee is selected the process to close the club will start.

Club Administration

Communication	Our primary method of communicating with members is email or mail. We email out the agenda/minutes, updates, request for assistance etc. Information is also put on the Guild notice board.
Important Messages “Message Book”	<p>The message book is designed for two-way communication between members, keyholders and committee as all are coming and going at different times.</p> <p>It is to inform the relevant party that a machine is broken, parts are missing from equipment, consumables are running low (sandpaper to dishwashing liquid, tea, coffee and cleaning products etc), or you have a question.</p> <p>Tell key holder of the day and write in the message book which is kept beside the sign in book at the entry of the Guild.</p>

Constitution	Under the legal rules of incorporation, the Club is required to operate under a formal Club Constitution.
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<p>Fundraising, Sponsorship and Grants</p> <p>“Teamwork makes the Dream work”</p>	<p>The Guild running costs are approximately \$12,000.00 - \$14000.00 per year. This includes, but not limited to: insurances, lease, electricity, water, machine maintenance and repair, facilities maintenance and repair, purchase and replacement of hand tools/equipment, woodwork and club consumables.</p> <p><i>*Your participation with helping out with fundraising is vital for the Guilds success</i></p> <p>There are four ways the Guild acquires funds: membership/attendance fee, fundraising, sponsorship and grants.</p> <p>Membership/attendance fee and /Fundraising*. These raise cash for the Guild which pays for the day to day running costs: insurances, lease, maintenance and repairs, purchase and replacement of hand tools/equipment, woodwork/club consumables etc. This is what keeps our doors open</p> <p>Fundraising activities include Sausage sizzles, markets, fairs, commission work. We are also looking the gallery and community classes.</p> <p>Sponsorship can be cash, in-kind services or goods offered by independent organisations for benefits offer by the Guild. These are not gifts; the Guild will have to offer benefits to the organisations that add value and can be measured.</p> <p>Grants are what allows us to purchase goods, hold events, provide training etc, however they do not cover day to day running costs.</p>
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Insurance	<p>The Guild is the holder of public liability insurance. This covers financial members for damage or injury caused to others. Conditions and Limitations apply.</p> <p>The Guild does not cover members for self-inflicted injuries. The Guild recommends members seek their own Accident Insurance Policy to gain cover for injury caused whilst working in the Guild.</p> <p>The Guild cannot and does not take responsibility for the loss or damage to any</p>
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	property stored, brought or made on Guild premises or any other venue the Guild may attend from time to time.
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Frequently asked Questions

Can I use the Guild timber when I want to make something?	<p>Absolutely, the timber stored at the Guild is for everyone to use. All timber is charged at a nominal rate, calculated per cubic metre.</p> <p>Check the notice board for the \$\$ rate and formula of how to calculate. If you are unsure the keyholder of the day can help you.</p> <p>Record what you paid for in the attendance book and place the \$\$ in the honour box or pay online (include your name and what it was for). Sorry, IOUs aren't accepted.</p> <p><i>Unfortunately, the Guild cannot be responsible for timber purchased left at the Guild if it goes missing. So, it is best to take it with you. If really necessary, you can label it with your name, date and paid - this still can't guarantee that someone else won't use it.</i></p>
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Does the Guild do work for the general public?	<p>At times the Guild is approached to carry out work for people who want a special project built. The Committee will assess the work required and ensure resources are available to get a satisfactory outcome. They will then seek input of time and effort from members to complete these projects to ensure it benefits, promotes and raises funds for the Guild.</p>
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Can I bring my friend, family or non-member to visit?	<p>Yes, we welcome and encourage you to bring your visitors to the Guild.</p> <p>There are a few rules that we need to follow when we have our friends or family visit to ensure everyone's safety:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Ensure your visitor/s sign in to the attendance book - When observing in the workshop or machine rooms PPE must be worn eg: a minimum is covered shoes and glasses - Follow verbal and written safety protocols and club etiquette. - Children must be supervised at all times <p>Please Note: Due to safety protocols visitors can't use any tools or equipment or carry out any type of work pertaining to woodwork.</p>
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Can I borrow from the Club Library?	<p>Yes, you can. Members must sign the borrowing book for items taken home.</p>
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Why do I need to sign-in	<p>Signing-in is primarily for WHS in regards to fire evacuations. It also gives the Club valuable information about attendance and is useful event planning.</p>
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Guild Representations	<p>Members are encouraged to attend functions of other woodworking clubs, schools and community groups representing the Guild. The Guild has club shirts and we encourage you to wear them when attending these events. Shirts can be purchased.</p>
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	Guild members are encouraged to enter woodwork competitions and to attend market days to display their woodworking talents and to sell their products.
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	However, only the committee are permitted to make public statements.
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What are some of the things I cannot do?

Yes, Guild resources are for all members to use and are the property of the Guild, not individuals. With the exception of purchased timber, no machinery, tools, equipment, etc are to be loaned or taken home.

Please do not:

- Remove, tamper or modify any guarding on any machines
- Disassemble any machinery unless supervised by keyholder or maintenance members
- Deliberately damage machinery or property
- Borrow or remove any plant, equipment, tools or property belonging to the Guild from the premises.

Member Commercial or Cottage Industry Operations

The Guild is a not-for-profit organisation and therefore, does not allow the manufacturing of goods for **commercial or cottage industry sale** on its premises and will not support members of such operation.

We do however, allow members to sell their items in the Guild Gallery for a 15% commission fee.

Breaches as listed, but not limited to, will result in membership cancellation and liability to make restitution for loss by the person or persons.
